Comments for the 13th session PCT Working Group meeting from 05 to 08 October 2020

Introduction

The Union Of European Practitioners In Intellectual Property (UNION-IP) is an Association of

practitioners in the field of Intellectual Property, that is of individuals whose principal professional

occupation is concerned with Patents, Trade Marks or Designs and related questions and who carry

on their profession independently or as employees. UNION-IP is a private, free, international

Association which is not dependent on any National or International Authority: it approves its own

members, in accordance with its Statutes, in total independence, and likewise decides on its own

activities and its own budget. It aims on the one hand to work continuously on current developments

in Intellectual Property in Europe, especially by making early submissions during the preparation of

proposed laws and treaties with the intention of influencing them; and on the other hand to devote

itself to the improvement of professional and personal understanding between European Practitioners

in the Intellectual Property field in different countries and different branches of the profession. The

following comments are filed on behalf of UNION-IP.

Review of the Supplementary International Search System (PCT/WG/13/4)

Point PCT/WG/13/4 REV. (the Document) of the agenda refers to the review of the Supplementary

International Search (SIS) System. The Supplementary International Search is being periodically

reviewed since its introduction into the PCT regulations in 2007.

The Document shows the numbers of SIS per year, which are quite low (average of ~60 per year),

and further elaborates that, considering the very low number of SIS requests per year, a new revision

of the system is required, since there will be further investment in automation of procedure. Two

options are therefore presented (e.g. beginning of page 5), and the Working Group is asked to decide

on recommending to the Assembly the maintenance of the SIS with a new revision or its abolishment.

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## Comments and Position of UNION-IP

The experience of Union-IP members is aligned with the numbers provided in the PCT/WG/13/4, of low to no usage of the SIS system.

The main identified hurdles are:

- a) lack of participating offices of a larger dimension,
- b) cost of the searches,
- c) lack of awareness.
- a) The only IP office of a larger dimension which is participating is the EPO. European applicants typically already have the EPO as ISA.

It could be interesting to have a SIS from an office that is relevant for a specific region or likely to come up with other prior art than the EPO, in order for an applicant to have more certainty about the chances in relevant national phases. These could be US, CN, KR and JP. However, none of these offices is presently a SISA.

- b) Cost of the searches could be reviewed, especially as it is typically higher than an ISA search.
- c) About awareness: we feel that a notice stating when and where a SIS could be requested would increase the awareness of such an option.

It is therefore suggested the maintenance of the SIS system and its improvement, with the following revisions:

- having all the IP5 offices as SISA,
- review costs, and
- issue a standard reminder of the SIS option to the applicant/representative.
